Pastoral Acts

For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery— Galatians 5:1

It's July. It's hot. It is the time when we celebrate freedom. In the traditional sense, we celebrate the freedom we claimed for ourselves as a nation from the tyranny of Britain those centuries ago.

In Christ, we also have a freedom we claim: freedom from sin and evil. When Paul reminded the Galatians that they had been set free, it was not only sin that was on his mind. The new believers were being asked to undergo circumcision in order to "fit" with the Jewish believers' assumption that just because they follow Jesus, did not relieve them from their obligation to the Torah. In their minds, freedom in Christ from sin did not mean freedom from the rules and regulations of their established religion.

How are we doing with this freedom? In what sense are we laying the burden of following the religious traditions of our day on the shoulders of those who are seeking to know God in all their fullness? When we share food, resources, love and compassion, is it totally free? It is a challenging thing to do outreach and know that it may only be a one-sided proposition.

It is very easy to fall into the pattern of placing conditions on our grace and hospitality. I thank God for the reminders we have in scripture that grace is always free, that God's unconditional love is exactly that—unconditional. It warms my heart every time I see our outreach ministry, community garden, or just individuals at St. Lucas doing justice, loving mercy, sharing kindness, all without limits or conditions.

There is a great Facebook meme going around that says: "God didn't call us to feed the hungry because they deserve to be fed; God called us to do it because they are hungry" (or something to that effect). I thank God that we are a people who love our neighbor just because they are our neighbor. No conditions. No limits. No exceptions. That is true freedom. So, celebrate your freedom in Christ by giving it away freely and joyfully.

"Do Something Kind for a Stranger." Tom Seeman's daily life goal

Tom grew up in Toledo

Tom is one of 12 children in a family who lived in the projects of East and North Toledo. Tom is a son of a Mom who conjured up love and care for all her children out of nothing. Tom is a son of a Dad who did not relate well or often to his children in positive ways: "Someone not to emulate."

Tom is a listmaker and notebook keeper. He kept lists of animals he wanted to see. Tom took the High School Aptitude test. He had no way of attending St Francis, a college prep school, but checked the box as a choice.

Sister Ann, Tom's principal, met with a priest, Father McMenamin, about Tom's test. Father McMenamin made a full scholarship offer to Tom to go to St Francis DeSales High School based on his scores.

Tom always contributed by working. He had a job at St Francis, too.

Tom was a 1977 St Francis DeSales High School Graduate

Tom was a highest honors Graduate of Yale University and Phi Beta Kappa

Tom had a Perfect Law School Admission Test Score.

Tom is a Graduate of Harvard Law School

Tom is a successful businessman, world traveler, continual learner, and studies animals. Tom is a family man. He and his wife Jenny live in the Boston area with their four kids. They also have three dogs and one cat.

Tom and Jenny contributed one million dollars several years ago to St Francis High School to help low-income, non-traditional, promising students with their tuition. These scholarship students are known as Seeman Scholars.

Tom is the author of a book ANIMALS I WANT TO SEE A Memoir of Growing Up in the Projects and Defying the Odds.

Tom Seeman was featured at the Toledo Lucas County Public Library Authors Program in 2024 to talk about his book. That is how he and his book came to my attention. He is connected to all of us who stumbled through a low income early life hoping that higher education might somehow be part of our future life. There are interesting and inspirational life experiences on every page of his book. I did not know this while I was reading the book, but I knew the high school friend, Barry, who he refers to, who recently died of Parkinsons, and Gene, another of his close friends from St Francis. I also learned that Tom had help in the writing of his memoir from Rita Zoey Chin, the author of Let the Tornado Come, a memoir about her own childhood hardships. St Lucas has a connection to St Francis, too, Dan Maza. Dan attended St Lucas for many years until he and his family moved from Walbridge Ave to Holland OH. There are probably many others.

It is an honor to celebrate Tom Seeman's life. Toledo was the place where he lived a difficult early life yet he grew into an educated man and a man who with great determination has helped many people.

Free HIV, Hepatitis C, & Syphilis Testing was offered along with Naloxone training, harm reduction supplies, pairs of socks/lock bags give-aways, reproductive health & wellness information, and information from other community organizations. •Café guests were joined by Jim & Kathy from Grace Alone Ministries, LLC (friends from Redeemer Lutheran) to talk about their furniture ministry. 

Inch by inch, row by row, Gonna make this garden grow! All I need is a rake and a hoe and a piece of fertile ground. Inch by inch, row by row, God bless these seeds I sow Keep them warm and safe below 'til the rain comes tumblin' down.

The Adopt-A-Garden-Bed program worked well this year. We have 20 of our 24 beds fully or partially planted already, and the remaining ones are either claimed or in the process of being rebuilt. We can look forward to harvesting tomatoes, both sweet and hot peppers, eggplant, okra, beans, raspberries, elderberries, purple potatoes, and a variety of herbs. The rhubarb has been harvestable for a month, it has set seeds and in a week or so, I will harvest those seeds and we'll have baby rhubarb plants available next year!

Early garden prep was done on March 15th by a work crew from the University of Toledo's Big Event. Volunteers from Alpha Chi Omega made short work of cleaning and prepping the beds, covering them in cardboard to keep the weeds at bay until time to plant. I picked up our plants from Toledo GROWS and a volunteer crew from Legal Aid came on Friday, May 16 to begin the planting. Our adoptive bed parents have been hard at work, panting and seeding in their adoptees.

We have seeds from the Toledo GROWS Annual Seed Swap available to anyone who would like to do some gardening at home – I will have them available on Sunday after 2nd Service, or call me if you're a Saturday or Early service attender and I'll get them to you. We will probably have more plants than we can squeeze into our space and I'll make them available too.

I will usually be in the Garden Mondays and Thursdays from 10:00 AM-ish until 2 or so and occasionally on Saturdays, as the Spirit moves me. If you would like to help tend the plants at a different time, call me and we can arrange a time to work together. Or, just drop in whenever – the Garden is always open – no gates, no fences, no locks! Y'all come!

particulars of their stewardship while providing food. Recipes shared by Katrina Smith for Khaza Brown Butter Cookies, Strawberry Cinnamon Rolls and Strawberry Compote,

were published.

You all know the story about the five loaves and two fishes multiplying to feed thousands under Jesus' grateful hands. You may or may not remember why the crowd formed. John the Baptist had been killed and Jesus had just received word of his death. John's disciples took John the Baptist's body and buried it, then they went to let Jesus know. Jesus went by boat to a quiet place. The Bible does not say how long Jesus stayed there, but word spread and a crowd started following Jesus on foot until there were about 5,000 people gathered. Jesus had compassion on the large crowd and healed their sick. The disciples asked Jesus to send the crowd away so they (the crowd) could go home and eat. Jesus would not let the people who were gathered to share their love with him go hungry. Jesus gathered the people on the grass, he gave thanks and prayed over the food. Then he gave the loaves and fishes to the disciples and the disciples passed food out to hungry people. There was plenty for everyone and 12 baskets of leftovers. How do you think Jesus on that day, despite his sadness about the death of John the Baptist, was able to share so much of himself, despite his sadness, to feed 5,000 people?

Do you look at feeding as stewardship? Following in the footsteps of Jesus, Salem feeds many people. St Lucas feeds many people every week along with St John's. Many other churches and groups in the Old South End feed people. Food and Eating equals community. Preparing food requires cooperation. All of that requires caring for each

other.

In the narthex every Sunday morning after each service: cookies, cakes, sandwiches, candy. Did I mention cookies? Last Sunday, fresh strawberries with angel food cake was

on the table. Every Saturday after the church service there is a table of good things to eat, too, which is as much part of the service as the service itself. What have you already done and are you doing this week as a good steward?
