

## WINTER FEAST OF ABUNDANCE


Was a wonderful success!! Over 220 people attended!

# Pastoral Acts

*Pastor Paul D. Myers III*

***Matt. 11:28*** “Come to me, all you who are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. ***29*** Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. ***30*** For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light.”

## Rest For Your Souls

This past year has been a year of listening in the Northwest Ohio Synod. It included listening to the voices in the congregations and our communities, listening to our own souls, and listening to God through prayer and scripture reading. The goal of listening is not only to hear the words, but to understand the hearts of those to whom we listen.

As we listen these days, we hear a constant theme (at least in my listening): we are scared; we are worried; we are tired. People are worn out by the stress of not knowing what the future holds. Will we be at war soon? Will we lose our healthcare? Will we be able to be our true selves in public?

This is what Matthew is addressing in this wonderful passage from chapter 11. Jesus knows how hard life is; he knows our worries and fears. And Jesus offers us the great exchange: “come to me with your burdens; lay them down. Take my yoke instead because it’s easier.” What is the yoke of Jesus? Simply put, it is the joining with Jesus in life’s struggles. When we yoke with Jesus, we have all the strength and power of God at our disposal to work through any problem or challenge. In fact, with the power of Jesus beside us, we are able to release our need to have all the solutions or to “muscle through” when hard times come.

You will find rest for your souls when you yoke with Jesus because Jesus brings all the power of the resurrection to your struggle. What a comfort it is to rest in the knowledge that in the midst of all our worry and hardship, God is walking with us to carry all of them. All we need to do is bring our burdens to God and feel that weight lifting off our souls. Prayer, worship, scripture, and serving our neighbor all bring the presence and rest of Jesus into our souls.

Be at rest as you start this new year, and be refreshed and energized by God’s presence to move into the kindom of the beloved community.

<sup>6</sup> Now while Jesus was at Bethany in the house of Simon the leper, <sup>7</sup> a woman came to him with an alabaster jar of very costly ointment, and she poured it on his head as he sat at the table. <sup>8</sup> But when the disciples saw it, they were angry and said, "Why this waste? <sup>9</sup> For this ointment could have been sold for a large sum and the money given to the poor." <sup>10</sup> But Jesus, aware of this, said to them, "Why do you trouble the woman? She has performed a good service for me. <sup>11</sup> For you always have the poor with you, but you will not always have me. <sup>12</sup> By pouring this ointment on my body she has prepared me for burial. <sup>13</sup> Truly I tell you, wherever this good news is proclaimed in the whole world, what she has done will be told in remembrance of her."—Matthew 26:6-13

**A New Struggle with Need** by Joel Vande Werken, Grand Rapids, Michigan

These are common situations: Families living paycheck to paycheck. Single [parents] trying to stretch their resources farther and farther. Homeless [people] on street corners holding signs that say, "Will work for food." Children with swollen bellies because they don't have food.

In place of the rich provision given by God in Eden, we now find poverty and material need. Sometimes poverty is the result of injustice and oppression. Other times it stems from bad choices made by people in need. Still other times it comes from circumstances beyond people's control: injury, disability, or corporate downsizing.

As societies, we struggle to know how to respond to inequality. We assign blame, often in simplistic ways.

Jesus' words in Matthew 26 about the poor have sometimes been used as an excuse to avoid helping people in need. But he was simply describing the brokenness in which we live. He also taught that in caring for needy people on his behalf, we will serve Jesus himself (Matthew 25:37-40). The woman who anointed Jesus was weak and broken. He protected her dignity and honored her struggle.

The poor are with us. Perhaps in this new year our love for Jesus will yield a new willingness to care for the weak and oppressed.

Let us pray:

*Lord Jesus, you left heaven to become poor for our sake. May we also be willing to enter the struggles of the poor in our midst and to serve them with the riches of the gospel. Amen.*
